EXECUTIVE CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

2014 has been a continuing year of growth for the Commission as it develops into Fiji's premier Sporting body, from the initial set-up in 2013. The challenges and reasons behind Governments desire for a National Sports Commission became very clear during this year.

Sports Development throughout the country needed clear direction, our talented and elite athletes needed nurturing and direction, our national sporting organisations needed responsibility and governance, and we needed an attitude change with regard to the funding of sports. The acceptance of the Commission and the relationships established with all our sporting bodies has allowed us to address these issues and through partnerships, discussions and understanding start to overcome them.

I must thank my fellow Board members for their continued input and assistance in ensuring to the direction of the Commission and in giving their support and backing especially with regard to sports development through the country not just for our elite but more importantly for our communities.

To the staff of the Commission I thank them for their commitment and continuing hard work and long hours and to their families for their understanding on their absence from home, as they travel to our rural areas on week long sports programs. I especially congratulate them on their input and personal development ensuring they can continue to deliver the best in sports programs.

To our line Ministry thank you for your backing and policy direction. It was a pleasure to meet and brief our newly elected Minister Laisenia Tuitubou and to our past Minister Villiame Napoto we thank him for his guidance and wish him well for the future.

2014 Issues, Challenges and Direction

Sporting Bodies - Responsibilities - Accountability & Mediation

The Sports Commission is tasked under the Decree to:

"Regulate all matters relating to sports in Fiji to ensure that all sports and elected officials comply with their constitutions, regulations and guidelines thus ensuring greater accountability of all sporting bodies; and tto help eliminate conflicts of interest within sporting bodies and through mediation intervene and solve disagreements"

The accountability and good governance of our national sporting bodies (NSO's) has been questioned and it became obvious that the Commission under its decree had to act accordingly.

The biggest issues raised were with regard to sports administrators and elected executives not understanding the rules that governed their own organisations, principally their Constitutions'.

In particular NSO annual general meetings had not been held or called, or they had proceeded without a quorum. Athletes and members were not being acknowledged and as such their performance was being affected.

A review was undertaken during the year on all NSO constitutions and the Commission was requested to mediate on a number of major issues. This resulted in a clear policy being established for the Commission to mediate and assist NSO's. The Board approved the appointment of a senior international lawyer to act on behalf of the Commission and when necessary review and issue recommendations to any NSO dispute. In one issue the advice of the Solicitor General had to also be sort.

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The accountability of all NSO's is now being achieved by ensuring that funding and sports development for individual sports was only to "eligible NSO's" who they had met the guidelines and responsibilities as approved under "The eligibility rules."

Sports Development

In collaboration with NSO development officers, provincial and district youth officers the Commission development staff successful ran a number of programs from 1 day to 10 days in both rural and urban areas, to communities, organisations and schools.

In 2014 the programs affected 28,430 Fijians from all walks of life, introducing a number of sports including not only the main stream sports but also minor or new sports.

All programs brought the benefits of sport to ensure a healthy lifestyle to the community and as importantly created the opportunity to observe and identify athletes with talent to be nurtured in the sport of their specialty.

Sports Grants

Our NSO's continue to view the Commission as the source for the majority of their funds especially for overseas tours and some believe that is the Commissions principal role.

In 2014 requests received from NSO's totalled \$2.7million for a Government budget allocation for sporting grants of \$1.1million.

Clear guidelines for grants had been established, "eligibility rules" put in place and the board approved the "Procedures & Guidelines on Disbursement of Grants". This ensured a fair distribution of available grants and that athletes and teams that were attending internationally ranked or qualifying events could be funded. Regrettably there were no funds for development squads to travel.

The Hosting of international events in Fiji was encouraged and we must thank Government in the substantial increase for this grant.

The establishment of the International Coaching grants has been well received and those sports that engaged coaches are already seeing the benefit especially in a change of attitude and better discipline of our elite athletes and teams. It is envisaged that the results will show in 2015 as we engage in a number of World events.

Highlights

Building on the success of last year's NSO conference for sports administrators a larger event was held in 2014 and we must thank Minister Naupoto for attending the full day event and for his contribution.

The Commission also assisted in the Hosting of the National Youth & Sports Conference and the National Disability Sports and Recreation symposium.

All of these events have provided the Commission with a better insight into the planning of ongoing programs and the needs of our communities.

All the staff and management of the Commission continue to show their dedication and commitment to the positions they hold and a number of training programs have been undertaken by everyone to upskill themselves not only in various sports but also in their personal development.

Over the past year it has been a pleasure working with all of our local sports administrators, athletes, coaches and the community and I thank everyone for their contributions to ensure to the long term goals of Government through the Commission and as part of the direction under our National Sports Policy.

KEY STRATEGIC GOALS 2013 - 2018

The National Sports Commission has been set up to establish higher standards of excellence in all sports delivery systems.

It is to ensure greater accountability of all sporting bodies and help eliminate conflicts of interest currently practiced by some federations.

It is to encourage the participation in sports and physical activity at all levels of society in the realisation that this will contribute to a healthier Fiji.

Based on the Corporate Objectives of the Fiji National Sports Commission (FNSC) and following feedback received from a Conference held with all National Sporting Organisations (NSO's) and continuing dialogue with all stakeholders, the FNSC Board has formed the following Key Strategic Goals:

- 1. Encourage and give opportunities for every citizen To actively participate in sports or physical activity in order to improve general health
- 2. Initiate, encourage, facilitate research and development in sports by organising and providing research, professional, and technical services in the areas of sports science, sports medicine and sports management
- 3. Establish standards for delivery at all levels of sports development and provide in partnership with NSO's, coaching and training personnel to deliver specialised sports programmes
- 4. Develop and implement programmes specifically aimed at persons who excel in sport or who have the potential to achieve high standards of excellence, inclusive of athletes, coaches, umpires, referees or officials essential to the conduct of sport
- 5. Provide support and financial assistance to NSO's, in the development of their sport and of their talented and high performance athletes to enable them to compete in overseas international competition
- Assist with the organisation and funding of community sports development programmes and with the Ministry of Education in programmes for physical activities and sport in schools

- 7. To encourage a greater participation in sports for people with special needs and the availability of regular and higher level competition and to promote sports opportunities, provision of for the training of people with special needs.
- 8. Regulate all matters relating to sports in Fiji to ensure that all sports and elected officials comply with their constitutions, regulations and guidelines thus ensuring greater accountability of all sporting bodies
- 9. To help eliminate conflicts of interest within sporting bodies and through mediation intervene and solve disagreements
- 10. Co-operate with national and international sporting organisations in aiming to foster a sporting environment that is free from the unsanctioned use of performance enhancing drugs and doping methods
- 11. Affiliate all sporting bodies, associations, organisations and districts to the sports NSO thus ensuring full accountability and transparency
- 12. Obtain commercial sponsorship and participate in marketing arrangements involving the endorsement by the Commission of products and services associated with sport.





Fiji National Sports Commission Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2014

Independent Audit Report

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Fiji National Sports Commission ("the Commission"), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2014, the income statement, statement of changes in equity, statement of cash flows for the year ended 31 December 2014 and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information as set out in notes 1 to 23.

Director's and Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The members and management of the Commission are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards for Small and Medium Sized Entities and the requirements of Fiji National Sports Commission Decree 2013. This responsibility includes: designing, implementing and maintaining internal controls relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and making estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I have conducted the audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing. Those standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the Commission's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Commission's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

Audit Opinion

In my opinion:

- (a) proper books of account have been kept by the Fiji National Sports Commission, so far as it appears from my examination of those books; and
- (b) the accompanying financial statements which have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards for Small and Medium Sized Entities:

- (i) are in agreement with the books of account;

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

1. General Information

Fiji National Sports Commission ("the Commission") is a body corporate incorporated under Fiji National Sports Commission Decree No.5 of 2013 and domiciled in Fiji. The address of the Commission's registered office is 220 Laucala Bay Road, Suva, Fiji Islands. The Commission is primarily involved in the promotion and development of sports in Fiji.

The financial statements were authorised for issue with a resolution of the members on 30 July 2015.

The significant accounting policies which have been adopted in the preparation of these financials statements are:

2. BASIS OF PREPERATION

(a) Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the Commission has been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards for Small and Medium-sized Entities ('IFRS for SMEs').

(b) Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis and do not take into account of changing money values or except, where stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

(c) Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Fijian currency, which is the Commission's functional currency. All financial information presented in Fijian currency has been rounded to the nearest dollar.

(d) Use of estimates and judgments

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with IFRS for SMEs, management of the Commission is required to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expense. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

Judgments made by management in the application of IFRS for SMEs that have significant effects on the financial statements and estimates with a significant risk of material adjustments in the next year are disclosed, where applicable, in the relevant notes to the financial statements.

Accounting policies are selected and applied in a manner which ensures that the resulting financial information satisfies the concepts of relevance and reliability, thereby ensuring that the substance of the underlying transections or other events is reported.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements, and have been applied consistently by the Commission.

(a) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are carried in the balance sheet at cost. For the purpose cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and cash at bank.

(b) Foreign currency

Foreign currency transactions are translated to Fijian currency at rates of exchanging ruling at the dates of the transactions. Amounts receivable and payable in foreign currencies are converted to Fijian Currency at the rates of exchange ruling at balance date. All exchange gains or losses whether unrealized are included in the profit or loss.

(c) Deferred Income

Government grant in aid and assets acquired at no cost to the Commission are capitalised and systematically recognised as other income on the basis of the expected lives of the assets to which the grant relates.

(d) Government Grant

The Commission receives operatig grant from the Government. Operating grants that compensate the Commission for expenses incurred are recognised as revenue in the income statement on a systematic basis in the same period in which the expenses are incurred. Operating grants that are used to compensate the cost of an asset are recognised in the income statement as revenue on a systematic basis over the useful life of the assets.

The Commission also receives sporting grant from the Government. The sporting grants are disbursed by the Commission to various sporting organisation and agency for overseas tours, sports scholarships, engagement of short term experts and hosting of international tournaments.

(e) Income Tax

Income of the Commission is exempt from income tax in accordance with Section 17(24) of the Income Tax Act.

(f) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment loss. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition and installation of the items.

Property, plant and equipment are depreciated on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives using the following rates:

Computer Equipment 20% Furniture and Fittings 20% Motor Vehicles 20%

Profits and losses on disposal of property, plant and equipment are taken into account in determining the results for the year

(g) Employee Entitlement

Annual leave

The liability for annual leave is recognized in the provision for employee entitlement. Liabilities for annual leave are expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date and are measured at their nominal values using the current remuneration rate which is expected to be applied at the time of settlement.

Long service leave

The liability for long service leave is recognised in the provision for employee entitlement and measured at the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date. Consideration is given to expect future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service.

Wages and salaries

Liabilities for wages and salaries expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are accrued up to the reporting date.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to Fiji National Provident Fund (FNPF) by the Commission are expensed when incurred.

(h) Trade and other payables

Liabilities are recognized for amounts to be paid in the future for goods and services rendered. Creditors and accruals are stated at cost.

(i) Leased Assets

The determination of whether an arrangement is, or contains a lease is based on the substance of the arrangement at inception date of whether the fulfillment of the arrangement is dependent on the use of a specific asset or assets or the arrangement conveys a right to use the asset.

Finance leases, which transfer to the Commission substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased item, are capitalized at the inception of the lease at the fair value of the leased property or, if lower, at the present value of the minimum lease payments. Lease payments are apportioned between the finance charges and reduction of the lease liability so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Finance charges are reflected in profit or loss.

Subsequent to initial recognition, the asset is accounted for in accordance to the accounting policy applicable to that asset.

(j) Comparative

Where necessary, amounts relating to prior years have been re-classified to facilitate comparison and achieve consistency in disclosure with current financial year amounts.

(k) Value Added Tax (VAT)

All the revenue, expenses, assets and liabilities are recorded at VAT inclusive prices. This treatment is based on the advised provided by Fiji Revenue Customs Authority on 31 January 2014. The reasons are as follows:

The Commission is basically providing funding and development of sports in Fiji and this is done through Government Grant funding. With such set up and with no taxable/business activities, the Commission is not registered for VAT. Any expenses incurred for which the Commission is charged VAT, the VAT portion will be cost to the Commission.

19. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES AND POLICIES

The Commission's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks: market risk and credit risk.

Risk management is carried out by management of the Commission. The Commission members provide direction for overall risk management covering specific areas, such as mitigating market risk and credit risk.

Risk is inherent in the Commission's activities but it is managed through a process of ongoing identification, measurement and monitoring, subject to risk limits and other controls. This process of risk management is critical to the Commission's continuing profitability and each individual within the Commission is accountable for the risk exposure relating to his or her responsibilities. The Commission is exposed to credit risk and market risks.

The independent risk control process does not include business risks such as changes in the environment, technology and industry. They are monitored through the Commission's strategic planning process.

The Commission members are responsible for the overall risk management approach and for approving the risk strategies and principles.

(a) Market risk

Market risk does not apply to the Commission since it is not involved in trading activities.

Political climate

The Commission operates in Fiji and changes to governments and the policies they implement affect economic situation and ultimately the grant income of the Commission. To address this, the Commission is not totally dependent on the government grants and forms partnerships with other donor agencies and corporate organizations for funding and regularly updates its policies appropriately.

Interest rate risk

At the reporting date the Commission did not have any interest-bearing financial instruments.

20. EVENTS SUBSEQUENT TO BALANCE DATE

No matters or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial year which significantly affected or may significantly affect the operations of Fiji National Sports Commission, the results of those operations, or the state of affairs of Commission in future financial years.

21. PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activity of the Commission is to guide and enhance the delivery of sports programmes in Fiji through a coordinated approach at all levels of participation by government statutory bodies and the community and to ensure the development of sports in Fiji. The Commission was established under the Fiji National Sports Commission Decree No. 5 of 2013.
